Crousen Power-House Track Team Competes at Nationals

The 2013 NCCAA National Indoor Track and Field Championships where hosted at Indiana Weslevan University located in Marion Indiana. Under the guidance of recent Big Country Hall of Fame inductee Coach Crousen, the men's track team landed second and women placed sixth. This is the men's first time to participate at the NCAA Division II level at the NCCAA national meet after winning national titles in NCAA Division III in 2008 and 2012. McMurry had a total of 40 talented student athletes, 21 men and 19 women, qualify for the NCCAA championship event.

Day 1 for the Mc-Murry track team stacked the men's team in second and the women's in fifth. Desmond Williams's outstanding jump set new records for the NCCAA, (previous record 23' 8"),

and McMurry, (previous record 23' 9 1/2"), jumping an astounding 24' 4 1/2". In the shot put event on day 1, mighty Paul Davis placed third with a weight toss of 53' 8 1/2". In the 60 meter dash Victor Cruz and Trevon Odom both advanced to the finals with Cruz coming in at 6.96 seconds and Odom at 7.00 seconds. The highlights in the women's competition were the powerful quartet of Paradise Hooper, Purity Hooper, Tiana Alexander and Shanita Coleman finishing second with a time of 1:43.41. Tiana Alexander qualified for finals in the 60-meters with a time of 8.01 seconds.

In Day 2 of competition the McMurry men's track team took second and women's team finished sixth. The highlights for the men's team started with a powerhouse shot by Paul Davis, 62' 1", breaking his own record, 61' 0 1/4", and destroyed the NCCAA's meet record, 56' 10 1/4", by more than five feet seal-



ing the men's track team second place! Not only in shot-put but in high jump McMurry's JuJuan Austin cleared 6' 7" crowning another national champ. The 4x40 relay team of

Chevante Bell, Willie Poindexter, Trevon Odom and Lance Andrews came in third with a time of 3:23.82. In the women's competition Tiana Alexander placed seventh in both the

60 meter and triple jump. In the women's 4x400 relay Paradise Hooper, Purity Hooper, Shanita Coleman and Jasmine Williams placed fourth with a time of 4:01.37. Congratulations

to all the War Hawk track and field competitors! We wish them the best of luck on their outdoor season as well.

A Formula of Humor, A Portrait of Laughs



You walk into a bar, with pictures all over the walls and décor that wouldn't look out of place at a museum. But don't let the setting fool you; this is a bar at the beginning of the 20th century. Picasso at the Lapin Agile, a play written by Steve Martin and directed here by Charlie Hukill, poses a simple question: What would Albert Einstein tell Pablo Picasso if he ran into him in a bar? The answer is as complex and amusing as the individuals involved. Be warned, the play is not for children; raucous adult humor abounds. Albert Einstein (played by Lee Jones) is a delightfully eccentric character, full of charm and wit while brightening up the room. His performance,

especially when compared to Picasso himself (Eric Hansen) is hilarious.

The rest of the character performances are no less witty or vigorous. Freddy the bar owner (Cody Carlisle) and his girlfriend Germaine (Ashleigh Davis) provide a more subdued performance, particularly when compared to Gaston (David Remschel), who arguably steals the show away from even the main characters. Suzanne (Kathryn Ballinger) brings in quite a bit humor herself, giving the audience a first taste of what Picasso will be like when he shows up. Other characters, such as the miserly Sagot (Jake Wade) and the ostentatious Countess (Aubrey Houston) are smaller roles, but no less important to the progress of the play. Sagot is a slick man, concerned with his own financial



progress in life, while the Countess is an excellent foil to Suzanne and Germaine, with her own brand of weirdness. The brief attendances of the Admirer (Shawnee Davis) and Schmendiman (Karl Taylor) keep it fresh before the

climax of the performance rears its head and a Visitor (Derek Salazar) the audience is sure to know shows up and throws everything in confusion for the characters.

The show is a fun one, sure to be enjoyed by all!

I met with David Remschel, McMurry Student and movie lover, and we discussed our predictions for the winners. For Best Picture, David and I both think Argo will win. David, who has followed many of these movies during the awards season, says Argo has already won many awards, and the movie and its director Ben Affleck have gotten a great deal of publicity. For best actor, David felt sure Daniel Day Lewis would snag the Oscar, and I hope he does for his performance of a lifetime in Lincoln. For Best Actress, my vote is Jessica Chastain in Zero Dark Thirty, and Best Director, we agreed, will almost

certainly go to Spielberg. Our favorites for best Actor and Actress in a Supporting Role are Lincoln's Tommy Lee Jones (though David also felt Christoph Waltz had a strong chance for Django Unchained) and Anne Hathaway for Les Misérables. I also feel Sally Field has a strong chance for Lincoln. Finally, David's pick for best original screenplay is Quentin Tarantino for Django Unchained, but my bet is on Wes Anderson & Roman Coppola for the indie darling Moonrise Kingdom.

Whoever wins, the Oscars are sure to be a wonderful night of entertainment and recognition of the talented people who provided us all with a year of stunning cinema.


ing album release also titled "Copper Man" which will be available on March 19th.

This turned out to be a great asset to ACIDIC because through this collaborative effort the band produced an ingenious idea for their upcoming album title. "It came out as we were practicing so I was just throwing ideas around and our drummer Matt thought that I was saying 'I am the Copper Man' and I was not, I was saying something like 'recover me' or something, but because it was all mumbled it sounded like 'Copper Man' and I totally just took that idea and I was like 'Dude that's tight, we're totally gonna call our album that now."

The sound that ACIDIC is their ideal sound and entirely new to the world

of rock and roll. "It's like exactly the sound we wanted to be like." Gossard says "It's like perfectly a mix between Jane's Addiction and Green Day and it took a long time to get this sound; I mean a lot of hard work and a lot of waiting on things and a lot of not sounding the way we wanted to. But eventually we got it all together and it's just so simple that it's ridiculous. It's just our basic rock and roll and everybody started digging it and so we just kept on doing it and this is a kind of culmination of our most recent efforts." These efforts are sure to be rewarded in "Copper Man" where ACIDIC claims to be at their best. This is the ACIDIC that both the band and fans have been waiting





McMurry University to host Sikes-Melugin Lectureship

The Religion and Philosophy Department at Mc-Murry University will host guest lecturer Dr. Robert Wilken, distinguished scholar of early and medieval Christianity, at the Sikes-Melugin Lectureship March 4-5.

Dr. Wilken will speak on "Ancient Christian Roots of Religious Freedom" at 6:30 p.m. Monday, March 4, and "Christianity and Religious Freedom in Colonial America" at 4:30 p.m. Tuesday, March 5. Both lectures will be in the Furr Welcome Center and are open to the public free of charge.

Dr. Wilken is the William R. Kenan Professor of the History of Christianity Emeritus at the University of Virginia. He is the author of 12 books, including The First Thousand Years: A Global History of Christianity, The Spirit of Early Christian Thought, and The Christians as the Romans Saw Them.

The Sikes-Melugin Lectureship in Religious Studies was given in honor of Opie L. and John G. Sikes and Ruby D. and Roy Melugin Sr., by their children and grandchildren.
